#### **Emerging Infectious Diseases: How Microbes Rule the World**

#### **Overview**

**Biology 11** is an introductory course for all students interested in pursuing study in biology. There are several offerings of Bio 11 each year. Each is designed to provide a synthetic overview of the life sciences and to introduce the fundamental ideas, processes and theories on which the modern life sciences are built. Different offerings of Biology 11 have different themes that the instructors have chosen to introduce fundamental concepts and develop a perspective on the life sciences. Bio 11 has two main goals. The first is to stimulate interest in the science of life. The second is to introduce you to problem solving and encourage critical thinking in the life sciences.

Readings from the primary literature will be assigned throughout the term and will be available via Canvas within the Lecture folders (most easily accessed through the course calendar page).

## **Meeting Places**

The regular class periods will be in person in LSC 201, with Zoom as a back-up in case of emergencies or closures. All class periods will be recorded and the videos will be made available via Panopto on Canvas (see Consent to Recording section below).

## Assessment of Your Academic Performance

We will have 4 quizzes during class period. The value for each quiz will vary based on the proportion of material covered. Quiz 1 covers 3 classes and is worth 10% of your final grade. Quiz 2 covers 4 lectures and is worth 15%. Quizzes 3 & 4 each cover 6 classes and are each worth 20%. Quizzes will focus on the topics covered in the preceding lectures. However, note that as the course progresses, we will take opportunities to link each week's topics with earlier ones; these connections will be reflected in the quizzes. The Final Exam covers 7 classes and includes a course-long review of major concepts, as well as integration and synthesis of all course material. The Final is worth 30%. The final 5% of your grade will be based on your digital poster.
